

From Justin... Rev's Ramblings -

It might seem a little strange for me to open my thoughts today talking about 'Christmas' again (well, specifically Christmas Television) with it now being February! However, since I wrote this in early January, perhaps you will give me grace? I was intrigued to find out that the festive viewing figures last year were topped by 'Gavin and Stacey' (12.32m.), followed by 'Wallace & Gromit' (9.38m.) and the Kings Speech (6.82m.). I wonder what your favourite Christmas viewing included.

With On-Demand television available 24/7, we can of course choose almost anything, at any time to amuse and entertain us. For Melissa and I, we watched two of the latest Jurassic Park films that we didn't even realise existed. But one of our absolute favourites during 'Twix-mas' period is the World's Strongest Man Competition, with the final on New Years Day. Ironically, the final is held in hot Myrtle Beach, South Carolina some 7mths earlier in May, so many months are spent avoiding any mention on the internet so that the result remains a surprise for our viewing on January 1st. We were delighted to see Scotland's Tom 'the Albatross' Stoltman win his third title in an exciting finale.

Now memories of Christmas and the World's Strongest Man competition fade and (hopefully not with our new year's resolutions!), I find myself reflecting on what it truly means to be strong. Watching the incredible feats of physical power—pulling trucks, lifting stones, and enduring gruelling challenges, I was inspired not just by the athlete's physical strength, but by their discipline, determination and resilience. I recognise these traits that were required in my previous career as a Royal Marine, as well as my ultra-marathon running endeavours.

As a Christian, this inspired me to think about another kind of strength—spiritual strength. The Bible speaks often of strength, not in terms of what we can lift or endure physically, but in terms of faith, perseverance and reliance on God.

Just as the world's strongest people spend years training their bodies, we must also commit to training our spirits. Paul writes in 1 Timothy 4:8, "For physical training is of some value, but godliness has value for all things, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come." Here are a few ways we can cultivate spiritual strength in 2025:

1. Start with the Word

The Bible is our ultimate training manual. Psalm 119:28 says, "My soul is weary with sorrow; strengthen me according to your word." Spending time daily reading Scripture, not just to check off a task, but to let God's truths sink deeply into our hearts. Like a daily workout, consistency is key.

2. Prayer: 'Your Spiritual Cardio'

Prayer connects us to the source of all strength—God Himself. Philippians 4:13 reminds us, "I can do all this through him who gives me strength." Making prayer a priority, whether it's through quiet moments in the morning, quick conversations throughout the day, or intentional times of intercession builds spiritual resilience and keeps us connected to the source of our strength.

3. Build Endurance Through Trials

Just as weightlifters push their limits to grow stronger, spiritual strength often grows through challenges. James 1:2- encourages us: "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance."

4. Community: 'Your Support System'

Strongmen often rely on coaches and supporters to encourage and push them forward. In the same way, we need a spiritual community to walk alongside us. Hebrews 10:24-25 reminds us to "spur one another on toward love and good deeds" and to "not give up meeting together."

5. Rest and Recovery in God's Presence

No athlete can train 24/7 without rest. Likewise, our spiritual growth requires moments of stillness. Jesus Himself often withdrew to quiet places to pray (Luke 5:16). Taking time to rest in God's presence, allowing Him to refresh and restore your soul.

A New Year - A New Strength

Building the kind of strength that doesn't fade with time but grows eternal is something any of us can look to regardless of age, ability or physicality. The world's strongest man may hold his title for a year, but the spiritual strength we cultivate in Jesus will sustain us for a lifetime—and beyond.


This year, let's lift the weight of forgiveness, carry the burdens of others in prayer, and stand firm in the face of trials. Let's be strong in the Lord and in His mighty power (Ephesians 6:10), knowing that our strength comes not from ourselves but from the God who created us.

May the rest of 2025 be filled with a deepening faith and the unshakable strength that only comes from walking closely with Jesus Christ.



Beer Village Heritage

2025 has started with a raft of low pressure weather systems which have produced some very wet and windy conditions which have been interspersed with a series of gloomy grey days. The latter are not

conditions which inspire one to work in the garden or start on new projects. However, hopefully most New Year's resolutions to keep fit, lose weight etc. are still being kept!

There are some signs that change is on the way. The days have lengthened perceptible since December 21st. That additional couple of minutes each day does make a difference. Our neighbour's snowdrop patch has been a picture since the turn of the year, and other bulbs are pushing through. The winter box (Sarcacocca) is in bloom and the perfume is delight in the evenings. The winter jasmine and mahonia are full of bright yellow flowers – and we still have a couple of nasturtium flowers giving a splash of colour. Keep an eye open for frog spawn and, if possible, report your sighting via the PondNet Spawn survey. Frogs and other amphibians have been in decline and these annual reports help scientists understand what is happening.

Beer Village Heritage has marked the new year by making a start on re-styling the fishtanks. The end of the room has been cleared and we are in the process of remodelling the display area. Our plan is to open in time for Easter as usual. You can enjoy the outside displays at any time of the year. We know that these are popular with youngsters and are very grateful to one of our volunteers who keeps an eye on the dynamos, ensuring that the handles are working, thus enabling children to appreciate alternative ways of creating a light source.

The forecast for New Year's Day was for 50 mph winds and heavy rain, so we were not surprised to find ourselves on a deserted beach at 1100, with no beach cleaners in sight! Eventually a lady from Walsall and her daughter appeared, saying that they were staying in the area and wanted to come and join us. Between us we collected a reasonable haul of bits of plastic, rope ends, fishing line and sweet papers. The visitors told us that their local council encourages residents to keep their immediate vicinity litter-free by giving them gloves and litter-pickers as well as a transparent rubbish bag. The latter is placed next to their rubbish bin for collection, which enables the council to gauge how much litter has been collected. We don't have a similar system here, but every day various local residents collect litter from the beach. Thank you all. You make such a difference to our village.

The Beer Art Groups' History Group is continuing to research the population trends in the village, starting with the 28 households – reckoned to be 113 people – recorded in 1086. It is suggested that one indication of population growth is the record of the original church – a chapel of ease – being extended.

Beer Village Heritage was saddened to learn that the Beer Virtual Museum website has been taken down. Our thanks go to Chris Pickles for all of the energy which he put into the project.

February's Branscombe Project talk is on Monday 24th and will be given by Rob Beard. He will talk about Dr. Rowe and "Branscombe's Bastard Fauna", looking at the fossils and fossil record in the chalk between Branscombe and Salcombe Regis.

The Axe Valley Heritage Association hosts the first of their 2025 talks on Thursday 27th February when Tom Cadbury will talk about the Seaton Hoard. The talk, in the United Reform Church, Cross Street, Seaton, starts at 1400 and you can book a seat via their FaceBook page.







But as Mahin opens herself up to new romance, what begins as an unexpected encounter quickly evolves into an unpredictable, unforgettable evening.

Beer Parish Council Newsletter January, 2025

Sadly Beer news got off to a sad start in 2025, with the announcement that Brian Potter had died on the 3rd January. Brian was a former Parish Councillor and served for many years on various Committees. He was also an active member of the community and gave his time to promote other organisations in the village. His towering upright stature will be missed around the village. The Council extends its sincere sympathies to his wife Deirdre and to his family.

In other happier news, the Council is pleased to be able to report that another survey of the state of repair and functionality of the watercourses throughout the village is underway, in the hope that flooding of parts of the village can be prevented during periods of heavy rainfall. Alongside this, the newly reformed Beer Emergency response Team Committee has already had several meetings to establish an action plan and a network of support if any unforeseen event occurs in the village putting lives and homes at risk. A financial grant has enabled the purchase of emergency radios and other equipment such as the "message in a bottle scheme" created by the Lions organisation. The plastic bottles in which the details of a person's prescription medicines and details of their next of kin etc. can be recorded, are then placed in the fridges of vulnerable people. In the event of the emergency services being called to a person's home, they will look for these details in the owner's fridge. This is the recommended place to put the bottle, as it will be the first area the emergency services will look. These plastic bottles are available free of charge to anyone in the village who feels they would like to have one. Family members are also encouraged to consider their elderly relatives and to set up a "message in a bottle" as well. Details of the whereabouts of these supplies can be obtained via the Clerk to the Council, or by visiting https://How it Works - Message in a Bottle, Lions Clubs International British Isles.

Regrettably, we are not able to report any progress being made in the Transfer of Assets plan with EDDC. We submitted the required expression of interest form to EDDC in 2024 and we have supplied details of the areas which the Parish Council would be prepared to consider taking over. Only assets which are proven to be totally financially viable within the Council's annual budget will be considered. A large amount of time and effort has been expended by the members of the asset transfer committee (many of whom are non-councillors-to ensure total democracy and scrutiny). Beer Parish Council has now given a deadline for EDDC to respond. We will await the District Council's response with interest. It is thought that the possibility of EDDC being made part of a Unitary Group, is the reason for the delay in it responding to Beer. Further details will be given in forthcoming editions of this newsletter.

The Parish Council has identified the need for a restructure of the running of the Mariners' Hall. The present schemes, under which the hall is run, were created in

the 1950's and they no longer meet the strict government requirements for the running of public spaces and areas. Fortunately, there are representatives from all the organisations in the village who regularly use the hall, on the management committee and they are keen to embrace the changes which are needed. It is hoped that the Mariners' Hall website will soon be updated and made more user friendly for both the village residents and for potential bookings for social events and gatherings. Further details will be given as progress is made.

At the meeting of the Council's Finance a General Purposes Committee in December 2024, recommendations for the setting of the forthcoming precept were agreed and those recommendations were subsequently adopted by the full Council. A request to EDDC in line with all local parishes has been submitted and details are available on the Parish Council website, under the Finance & General Purpose meeting 11th December 2024 minutes. The Parish Council recognises the financial plight of many of its residents in these difficult times and every effort to keep costs down will be taken.

Parish Council meetings take place each month in a relaxed but totally correct atmosphere, under the leadership of our Chairman and our excellent Clerk, Nicky Ingarfield. Public participation is very welcome and as there is a current vacancy on the Council, residents are encouraged to come along and consider joining the team.

Your Village Needs You!

The Parish Council are in the process of producing the village emergency plan. The plan is an extensive document detailing how the Council and Volunteers would respond in the event of an emergency, this could be anything from flooding to a severe road traffic accident.

For the plan to work we need more volunteers, in particular residents with 4-wheel drives, plumbers, electricians as well as residents who could just muck in and lend a hand to support others, we know that the village is very fortunate to have lots of wonderful health care professionals, would any of you be happy to share your details (name and phone number) with us?

We hope that we never have to use the plan, in which case we would never need to call on you, but we do need to have the plan in place, just in case! The emergency services may not always be able to get to the village and Beer has always shown itself to be an amazing community in times of need, for example during Covid, it would be amazing if we could just have details of people who would be willing to help in the unlikely event of an emergency. 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

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

Axminster and District Choral Society 1985 – 2025, Forty years of the joy of singing
