## From Justin Rev's Ramblings

I still remember the weight of my bergen in the Royal Marines. A bergen is a large, robust backpack suitable for carrying all the essential load required for field operations. Fully loaded, it could feel as though you were carrying your mate on your back on top of your webbing (belt kit), your rifle, and anything else they could strap to you. It wasn't just heavy: it shaped how you moved, how you breathed and how long you could keep going.

When I began distance running, I was struck by the contrast. The mandatory race kit—waterproofs, map, water, foil blanket, headtorch—felt like air by comparison. Perfectly sensible, carefully chosen, necessary for safety, but nothing like the “two-tonne” packs of earlier days. The difference wasn't just the weight: it was intention. You carried only what you needed.

As we approach Lent, I find myself thinking about the weight I carry now, not on my back, but within. Emotional weight. Spiritual weight. The quiet physical tiredness that accumulates over time. Some of it is obvious; much of it I hardly notice until I really stop and pay attention.

I carry concerns picked up from the news, worries for people I love, communities I serve, anxieties I don't always name. I carry old habits of self-reliance, the tendency to keep going rather than ask for help. I carry expectations—of myself, of others, of the Church. None of these are dramatic, but together they add up, like additional stones in my backpack.

Lent does not only begin by asking us what we will give up. Perhaps it also begins by asking us what we are already carrying. It can be a season of learning what we truly need to carry and what we can, at last, set down.

What are you carrying as we step into the second month of 2026? What are the rocks in your pack? What are the things that were once useful, or at least familiar, but now weigh you down? What do you need to unload, not because it is bad, but because it is no longer yours to carry alone? What do you need to share with someone you trust, rather than straining under it in silence? And what do you need to bring another in to help carry, as we once did on long ‘yomps’ (marches)?

And then there are the things that can only be laid down. At the foot of the cross, we are invited to set down what cannot be fixed by effort or endurance: regret,



grief, fear for the future, those things we cannot control. Not discarded, but entrusted.

To a crowd, weighed down by the impossible demands of the law makers, governors and leaders of the day (sound familiar?) Jesus Christ famously said:

*“Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light.”*  
(Matthew 11.28-29 NIV)

It is a message as applicable to us today, as is it was for Jesus' first century audience.

A yoke is an agricultural tool, that would be strapped over an animal to enable them to carry or drag a load, as well for situations requiring one animal to be ‘yoked’ to another to share a load together. Instead of attempting to bear the load of our lives and experiences solely on our own shoulders - be that pain, worry, doubt, fear, guilt or anything else - Jesus bids us to come to him, to invite him into those matters that weigh us down and to lay those ‘heavy rocks’ at his feet. In doing so, I believe we begin to discover the deep soul rest that can only be found in him, and a peace in his sharing of the load as we learn from his gentle transformative leading in our lives.

Throughout Lenten seasons of the past I have abstained, I have exercised good deeds, I have picked things up and I have created space. This Lent, I am not interested in proving what I can carry, instead seeking to be more attentive to what I might carry differently or not at all. Lent is a journey, so this year I wish to discover its grace found not in what I might endure, but in what I am willing to set down, let go of, to share with Jesus and place into his care.

In doing so I am reminded of the words of my spiritual director back in 2022 as I prepared to come to Seaton and Beer. Knowing my military background, he said *“Justin, what does it mean for you to travel lightly?”*, and he wasn't talking about running or the Royal Marines.

So, this month, I am myself asking:

*What am I carrying into Lent this year?*

And what might become possible if I travelled a little lighter?

And what about you? What does it mean for you to ‘travel lightly’ this Lent?

Grace and peace.







2026 marks the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the inscription of our Dorset and East Devon World Heritage Site – the “Jurassic Coast”. In those 25 years people from around the world have come to visit the area, with many returning to discover more about our fantastic coastline. “Jurassic Coast” has been recognised as being somewhere very special and visitors as well as locals have learned to love its variety and individual places.

You will be able to join in with the celebrations at various activities along the coast, including some in Beer. One of the first dates to note is Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> February when you can enter the Charmouth Beach Cleaning Championships. The event starts at 1000 sharp and is being organised by Charmouth Heritage Coast Centre and Clean Jurassic Coast. There will be prizes!!

Our own annual Beach Clean on New Year’s Day was very well attended and resulted in an impressive haul of very small bits of plastic and other rubbish. As usual, there was a cache of grommets from the Napoli, and there were several items which could have been put into the recycling bins rather than being abandoned on the beach. Changing public attitudes is a long-winded process!

The Jurassic Coast is the only place in the world where the rocks and fossils of the Geological era known as the Mesozoic can be traced in the order in which the rocks were laid down. The Mesozoic era consists of 3 periods, Triassic, Jurassic and Cretaceous and covers a time span from 250 million years ago to 66 million years ago. It showcases changes which took millions of years to happen. I am so used to thinking in these slow motion time-scales that I’m finding it difficult to appreciate that Beer’s Innes Fitzgerald ran the Exmouth Parkrun in 15 minutes and 27 seconds. In doing so, Innes became the fastest British female Parkrun runner – a fantastic achievement.

Being able to appreciate the Jurassic Coast doesn’t depend on a knowledge of geology. Just enjoy the landscape, watch the sunset, go for a walk and savour the views of the ever changing sea. Running, walking, swimming, paragliding, sketching, beach-combing and bird-watching are all ways of enjoying our very special coastline. What’s your favourite?

The Fine Foundation Centre is now closed until Easter. Some of our

members will be busy helping to raise money to support our various activities and will be out in force for the *Grizzly* on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> March when we will, along with the RNLI, man the water station in Beer Head Caravan Park. Call out “hello” as you run by!

February’s Branscombe Project talk sees the return of Professor Mike Parker-Pearson to tell us about “Yet More Amazing Discoveries” at Stonehenge. It is on Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> February at 1930, in the Branoc Hall.

The Axe Valley Heritage Association are hosting a talk by Dr. Wendy O’Neill entitled \*The Road to Seaton”. The talk is on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> February at 1400 and tickets, to be purchased in advance, are available from Paperchain in Beer Road.

We seem to be in a cycle of wet and very windy weather at the moment, and going out to work in the garden does not feel very appealing. Clearing and cleaning the greenhouse has made us feel very virtuous! Walks around the garden have confirmed that some of the snowdrops are earlier to flower than usual. The birds are appreciating everything on the bird-table, and the usual blue, long-tailed and great tits are being joined by goldfinches and a black-cap. Even the robins are attacking the peanuts, while the sparrows and wrens spend their time investigating piles of leaves or poking about in flower-pots. We are trying to ensure that work which needs to be done near nesting boxes is done in the next couple of weeks – it won’t be long before our feathered friends start building their nests. As I write this, the annual Big Garden Birdwatch is imminent, so hopefully some of you will have been able to take part.

## CHAPEL ASSOCIATION BEER

### Chapel Update: Progress and Plans February 2026

We are pleased to share an update on the ongoing work to secure the future of the Chapel and develop it as a community asset.

The establishment of a new Community Interest Organisation (CIO) is now well underway. Trustees have been appointed, including three members from the local community and two representatives from St Michael's Church, and the application is currently with the Charity Commission. Alongside this, a wider Chapel Association Beer (CAB) working group has been formed, bringing together additional members of both the church and the wider community to help shape the project.

Following the submission of many thoughtful suggestions, it was agreed that Chapel Association Beer (CAB) is a positive and fitting name for both the group and the CIO. A new logo has also been designed (see above), symbolising the Chapel's Christian foundations alongside one of its exciting potential community uses as a Champing™ venue. Champing™ is the unique experience of camping overnight in historic churches; more information can be found at champing.co.uk.

You may have noticed scaffolding around the Chapel during November and December. This allowed for essential roof works, including significant slate repairs to the ridge line, replacement of a large number of slates, and repairs to the rear elevation. These works, costing £4,000 plus VAT, were made possible by an extremely generous donation and have ensured the building is now watertight. While this is a short- to medium-term solution, longer-term plans involve a full roof replacement, which will require a bat survey, faculty approval and substantial fundraising. Nonetheless, CAB is delighted that progress can now be made on plans to bring the Chapel back into community use in the meantime.

Power and drainage remain key facilities that would significantly enhance the range and sustainability of future community uses for the Chapel. Following meetings with National Grid and local contractors, CAB now has quotations and a clear pathway for providing an electricity supply to the building. Drainage and water present a more complex challenge. CAB representatives have met with a local water company and are actively exploring a range of options for toilet facilities, including environmentally friendly waterless alternatives, such as those available from specialist providers of waterless toilets (e.g. [www.waterlesstoilets.co.uk](http://www.waterlesstoilets.co.uk)), particularly those specialising in needs for churches in rural locations, where access can be very difficult.


A meeting is being arranged with the Exeter Diocesan Buildings Advisor to discuss future permissions, options for the internal fabric, potential community uses, and the churchyard itself. CAB also understands that East Devon District Council is aware of, and has a plan to address, the trees along the rear of Barline, with work expected to be imminent if not already underway. The next CAB meeting will take place at the end of January which will begin in the Chapel itself.

Looking ahead, CAB hopes to open the Chapel for viewing in early spring for our wider community. It will be some time since we last gathered there as a community in 2025, and this will be a valuable opportunity to visualise the future, ask questions and share ideas.

Finally, a huge thank-you to everyone who has supported this community venture so far, including Beer Quarry Caves, The Pumpkin Show, St Michael's Church, the CAB working group and trustees, and the many individuals who have contributed time, expertise and encouragement.


