

From Justin Rev's Ramblings

The turning of the year invites reflection. For some, it brings a sense of hope and fresh possibility, whilst for others, a quiet weariness, or even apprehension about what lies ahead. For many of us, it is a mixture of both. Life rarely fits neatly into the promise of a "new beginning" on 1st January. The joys and challenges of the past year do not disappear overnight and the world we step into feels no less complex or fragile than the one we have just left.

As we look around our world today, it is hard not to feel unsettled. We continue to witness conflict and suffering on a global scale, divisions that feel increasingly entrenched and a level of uncertainty that affects everything from the cost of living to our sense of security and belonging. The pace of change can feel relentless, and the noise overwhelming. Many people carry a deep concern for the future, not just for themselves, but for their children, their loved ones, and the wider world.

Yet alongside these global anxieties are the very personal stories each of us carries into this new year. There are joys to be cherished: moments of laughter, relationships that have deepened, new life welcomed and prayers quietly answered. And there are challenges too: grief that still aches, health worries, loneliness, strained relationships or simply the tiredness that comes from navigating yet another demanding year. Some begin this year with gratitude, others with questions and many with both.

The New Year often comes with an unspoken pressure to make resolutions to be better, stronger, more organised or more successful. While there can be value in reflection and intention, this way of thinking can also leave us feeling inadequate or anxious, as though the burden of making the year "work" rests entirely on our shoulders. Is it any wonder that most new year resolutions get left behind by the turn of February. The Christian faith offers a gentler and deeper invitation, not to reinvent ourselves, but to walk more attentively with God, trusting that we are met with grace rather than judgement.

A few years ago, I included in this parish magazine a poem that feels especially worth returning to now: *The Gate of the Year*, written by Minnie Louise Haskins. It



was quoted by King George VI in his Christmas broadcast in 1939 at the very beginning of a time of immense uncertainty and fear. Its words speak powerfully into moments when the future feels unclear.

*"I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year,
'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.'
And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God.
That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way.'"*

There is something deeply honest in this message. The request for light is understandable, as we all long to see ahead, to know what will happen, to feel in control. Yet the answer given is not a map or a guarantee, but a relationship. Not certainty, but trust. Not a promise that the path will be easy, but an assurance that we do not walk it alone.

This is the heart of Christian hope. It is not blind optimism, nor a denial of fear or difficulty. Hope does not pretend that suffering will vanish or that answers will come quickly. Instead, hope is rooted in the faithfulness of God, the presence of God who walks with his people through wilderness and uncertainty, who is present in joy and sorrow alike, and who remains steadfast even when the way ahead is unclear.

As a community, this matters deeply. The Church (your church) is not simply a place for those who feel confident and certain, it is a place for real people, living real lives, bringing their whole selves, that includes our doubts, hopes, griefs and joys, before God. It is a reminder that none of us are meant to carry life alone. Together, we learn to place our hands again and again into the hands of God, trusting that his love is stronger than our fear and his light sufficient for each step.

As this new year unfolds, my prayer is not that it will be trouble-free, but that we will discover personally and together, a deeper awareness of God's presence. That in moments of joy, we will give thanks, in moments of struggle, we will find support and in moments of uncertainty, we will have the courage to trust and keep the faith.

May this be a year in which we walk gently, love generously, and hope quietly but confidently, not because we know what lies ahead, but because we know the One who walks with us.

A Very Happy New Year to you all,
and a huge Thank You to everyone
who has supported Beer Village
Heritage over the past year.

By the time that you read this we likely will have welcomed in 2026 with our traditional Beach Clean. Our thanks, in advance, to everyone who came to help, and to everyone who takes time to pick up rubbish throughout the year. It is so gratifying to hear how litter-free the beach is on a daily basis. We are proud of you all.

The Fine Foundation Centre will be closed from New Year until Easter, during which time we will be looking at some of the displays and deciding on various changes. Some of them date back to when the centre was opened and are showing their age!

Once again we will be supporting Axe Valley Runners when they stage The Grizzly, this year named “One Step Beyond”, on Sunday March 8th.

Before that the Branscombe Project talk on January 26th will return to Vindolanda, by Hadrian’s Wall, to find out how climate change is affecting the excavations. Many of the artefacts about which we heard last January are preserved by being in boggy land. The bogs are gradually drying out, and the Roman remains, especially those made of wood, such as the correspondence written on bark, is being destroyed.

East Devon Local History Groups held their annual conference recently. As usual there was a round-up of information from around the area which again illustrated the eclectic nature of the interests of the individual groups. For instance, the Blackdown Hills group organized guided tours to RAF Culmstock and Dunkeswell Abbey as well as talks and workshops on archaeological finds locally including lumps, bumps, pots and clay pipes. They held an exhibition celebrating the first Young Farmers’ club amongst other things. Their next project is recording non-conformist chapels in the area.

Fairlynch Museum had new exhibitions this year on the history of shops in Fore Street; Women’s dresses of the Georgian period; and textile art by a local artist.

The group in Lympstone produced a history of the village in specially composed song for a 40-strong choir alongside costumed actors. They offered 3 performances in the church as well as selling programmes which

contained the words of the songs as well as the spoken material. One of their members has produced a number of books on village characters and events while another has put together a programme of old films about the village.

East Budleigh History Society staged a Maritime Heritage Event during the year, which made use of the Otter Valley Association archives. In May 2026 the group is staging a Peacemaker Festival to celebrate Roger Conant, who lived in the village and who founded Salem, in Massachusetts in 1626.

Barbara Farquarson reported on the Branscombe Project and talked about the talks held during the year.

The Sid Valley Local History Group reported on a variety of research projects undertaken by different members. These included information on the “Defoe” storm on 1703, which is still believed to be the worst storm ever experienced in the U.K.; an account of the collapse, in 1924, of the esplanade and its subsequent rebuilding; and the history of the £12 paid annually since 1641, originally by the feoffees and now Sidmouth Consolidated Charities, to the church for communion wine. The group has now been wound up by the Sid Valley Association but their digitised materials will continue to be accessible at:



Some after-Christmas thoughts

Why is Christmas when it is?

In the depth of Midwinter, when the days are shortest and the shadows longest, comes the winter solstice: the return of the sun. A long time before the Anglo-Saxons converted to Christianity, 25th December — at that time the date of the winter solstice in the Julian calendar — had been chosen as the day on which to commemorate the birth of Christ, and a festival on this date is first recorded at Rome in 336.

This date was probably chosen not primarily because it was the solstice, but because it fell nine months after the spring equinox (25th March in the Roman calendar), which had perhaps already gained acceptance as the date of Christ's conception. But the winter solstice was, of course, a meaningful day on which to celebrate the birth of the Creator of light. **As we lookback to our ancient forebears we might ask whether the Anglo-Saxons had a midwinter festival before the coming of Christianity and Christmas?**

Most of what is documented comes, as so often, from the work of the Venerable Bede (c672-735). His references to pagan practices suggest distaste for what he perceived as 'primitive' behaviour and records that there was a month called Blodmonath (*Bloodmonth*) which equated to November. The name came from the fact that this was the time of year at which the pagans slaughtered their cattle, first dedicating them to the gods and making sacrifices. Bede says that **the Old English word for month (monath) came from the word for Moon**, since the pagan calendar was a lunar one (unlike the Roman and Christian solar calendar). He also says that the Winter season, according to the Anglo-Saxons, began after the Autumn Equinox, at the first Full Moon in what is now October. **Winter's first festival was thus the sacrificial feasting celebrated in Blodmonath.**

Bede also goes on to say that the pagan year began on a date fixed by the solar calendar. This was the Winter Solstice, on 25th December, which gave him the opportunity to point out that this same day is now when Christians celebrate the birth of Christ. Bede calls the festival which marked this pagan New Year Modranecht or Mothers' Night.

The text of a letter written in 601 A.D., by Pope Gregory to Mellitus, the missionary who was then going to Britain, is preserved by Bede; and in it the Pontiff wisely tells him not to put a stop to the merrymaking and

feasts of the Anglo-Saxons whom he may convert to Christianity, but to adapt the old pagan customs to the rites of the Church, and to maintain the festivities, only changing the reason for them from a heathen to a Christian impulse. **This advice was followed; and thus today we have our merry Christmas in England and across the world.** And who shall say that we are idolaters because we have taken over a heathen holiday, with all its laughter and all its good cheer, and have turned it into a celebration of the greatest event in the world's history? In these dark days, when the world seems cold and many are more concerned about themselves than about their fellow man, we would do well to model ourselves on our Anglo-Saxon forbears, as the great king Athelstan did: to rejoice, to share the bounty of the earth and the goodness which we derive from the Supreme Being and Creator of all things and to be a light of goodness, mercy, grace, hope and generosity.

May the lessons of universal brotherhood and friendship, at the heart of all the great faiths, shape you and the year that is to come for the better.

Is Santa Claus real?

Well, it's fairly certain that he WAS real. St. Nicholas (literally Santa Claus) was a 4th-century Christian bishop of Myra, a city in the region of Lycia, which is in modern-day Turkey. Born around 270 AD in the coastal town of Patara, he was tortured for being a Christian bishop during the reign of Emperor Diocletian. Later under Emperor Constantine, he participated in the Council of Nicaea, during which he was fabled to have slapped the "heretic" priest Arius (actually not a heretic until after the Council).

Nicholas was known for his deep faith, generosity, and acts of kindness, especially toward children and the poor. One of the most famous stories about Nicholas recounts how he provided dowries for three impoverished sisters - whose father would otherwise have been forced to sell them into slavery, a not uncommon practice - by secretly delivering sacks of gold to their home at night. After his death on December 6, 343 AD, Nicholas was declared a saint, and his legacy inspired the modern figure of Santa Claus. It was probably the story of the dowries which inspired the belief about Santa bringing gifts.

- The most valuable thing you can ever give another person is your whole undivided listening attention. Real listening is simply being present and holding the eyes of the speaker. Real listening has all the time in the world. Real listening isn't waiting for the other to stop talking so that you can speak. Real listening absorbs what is being said. Real listening is rare, which is why it is so highly valued.
- Wherever you are it's always Here and the time is Now. Don't be elsewhere. Be Here Now. No mentally projected future can ever be more important than the moment you are in now. If you have regrets for the past and worries for the future, both dissolve in The Present Moment.
- Like many people, you carry anxieties, worries, fears within you – burdens of life. Is the fear out there in the world, or is it in you? If you cannot feel calm and at peace, ask "What is it that I fear may happen? And how much does it really matter?" Your life may bring hardships but not one of them – if you so choose – has to break into your inner peace and calm.
- In the morning, before the putting on of clothes and the brushing of teeth, begin the day with a moment of Inner Stillness. A breath in presence. It grounds you and centres you. It allows a foundation of calm to arise.
- Being still puts you in touch with your essential nature. Everything that happens in daily life is fleeting, but your essential nature is eternal. The most precious of all gifts come from your essential nature: love, kindness, beauty, compassion, peace of mind. They are not of this world. They are free.
